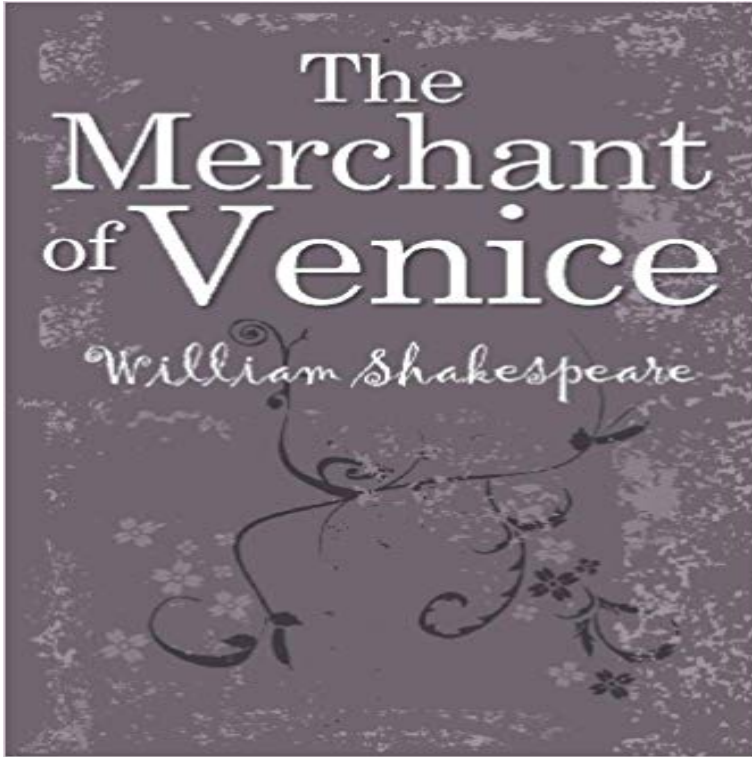


The Merchant of Venice
